Model answer:

At the beginning of the story, Bathsheba is a beautiful young girl, but she is also very vain and doesn't care much about the feelings of other people. She is used to getting her own way, and does things without thinking about what will happen, like sending a Valentine to Boldwood as a joke. She does not realize that this is not only silly but dangerous. She refuses to listen to good advice and gets angry with people who offer it. She makes some bad mistakes, causing terrible problems for herself and others. Her biggest mistake is marrying Troy. However, as the story continues, she learns from her mistakes and becomes a softer, kinder person. She also learns what qualities are most important in a person, and this is why she marries Gabriel. She has also become stronger and learned many things from running her own farm.

Model answer:

Boldwood is ten years older than Gabriel,

and Troy is a couple of years younger. Troy is the most handsome of the three. Gabriel and Boldwood both know about sheep farming, but Troy has a very different kind of job as a soldier. Gabriel and Boldwood are much more serious kinds of men than Troy. Troy likes women, and has a lot of experience of them, and knows how to make them fall in love with him. But Gabriel and Boldwood have little or no experience of women, so for them, falling in love with Bathsheba is very serious.
